Committee Report

Stockman's Breakfast..... Marwood Hallett

Dr. Debra Thatcher, President of our Umpqua Community College will be with us to present and to learn. This will be her first time with us so we can get her perspective but also provide input to her about our needs and concerns. So, come prepared. She will also have a couple of staff with her who will help us get a handle on "blockchain" and other business issues.

In January Sherriff John Hanlin will join us and in February we will hear from Clark Smith, Corteva Agriscience on the latest in pasture brush and weed options. March will feature a visit from Chris Vest, OR OSHA providing an overview of what to expect if audited for safety issues. All ranches and farms can be subject to audit.

As a follow up from last month, we learned from Greg Roush that Purina labs will do free forage and water tests for producers. The content of forage guides us as to what supplements/minerals/etc. are needed.

We also discussed the fact that minerals in livestock water, such as iron, copper, sulfur can bind up and block minerals, we put out, from being absorbed by the animals. So, these tests are good and available free. Our local contact is Dan Parks, Purina rep, and staff person at Douglas County Co-op.

Also, I mentioned a radio report I heard, on the way to breakfast, of new ODFW rules regulating the disposition of Elk taken by landowners due to damage. The report was that only one elk could be taken and it had to be given to charity (not kept by the landowner). When we all questioned that policy, I checked and found that a couple of media reports said exactly that. However, I then checked the ODFW website and learned that it is the FIRST elk that must be handled that way. More than one permit is available but it is true that the first animal taken on a landowner damage permit must be given to a verifiable, local charity. So, I stand corrected in what I said publicly.Marwood

Heifer Replacement Program.....Veril Nelson

Each year the DCLA presents up to two heifers to youth who are selected by a committee appointed by the board of DCLA.

This year's heifers went to Molly Kenagy who received her heifer from Veril Nelson and Josie Maddox whose heifer was donated by Linda Sherman. This is the second donation for each of these contributors.

To be considered, students must complete an application and submit it to the extension office by September 15th of the current year

Eligible students must be between 5th and 11th grade at time of application and can be 4-H or FFA members and they must have exhibited a livestock project at the Douglas County Fair prior to time of application. This program requires that the student have adequate facilities or a suitable location to keep the heifer and provide the feed for the animal.

Our 2018 winners, Aubrey Murphy and Vincent Morgan also showed their bred yearling heifers at that show. In spite of some challenges, both heifers are on track to calve sometime in 2020.

Distinguished Service awards, consisting of Pendleton blankets, were presented to two deserving recipients.

Dr Woody Lane was honored for his many years of service to the community as a teacher in the areas of livestock nutrition and forage management. Dr Lane has also been a member of the DCLA board for over 20 years and ran the Stockmen's breakfast until the last few years.

Purebred Breeders.....Lee Sandberg

An annual ultrasound clinic is held most years, usually in March. Live animal carcass ultrasound is used to estimate carcass retail yield and meat quality. The common traits estimated include ribeye area (REA), backfat (BF), rump fat (RF) & percent intramuscular fat (IMF). This allows better accuracy and data which can help improve herd performance.

Informational Reports

Farm Service Agency

The only program now available to livestock owners is the Livestock Forage Program (LFP)

LFP provides payments to eligible livestock owners and contract growers who have covered livestock and who are also producers of grazed forage crop acreage (native and improved pasture land with permanent vegetative cover) that has suffered grazing losses due to a qualifying drought during the normal grazing period for the county. Douglas County entered into a severe drought for a short period during February, which made local producers eligible for payments.

LFP also provides payments to eligible livestock owners or contract growers that have covered livestock and who are also producers of grazed forage crop acreage on rangeland managed by a federal agency if the eligible livestock producer is prohibited by the federal agency from grazing the normal permitted livestock on the managed rangeland due to a qualifying fire. Producers have until January 30, 2020 to apply for benefits under the livestock forage program To sign up call Cindy, Tyree or Phil at FSA. 541-673-6071

Predator ControlDan Dawson

The Indigo Group of wolves, with a recent litter of four pups, has been confirmed in Douglas County. There have been a number of confirmed livestock fatalities by wolves in Klamath and Jackson counties in addition to other probable depredations in counties as far west as Curry/Coos.

USDA Wildlife Services hired a Conflict Prevention Specialist to work with Ranchers on non-lethal methods to prevent wolf depredation. Alyssa Mahaney will work out of Grants Pass. She has a bachelor of science in wildlife management and should complete a masters in sustainable management of natural resources in December. She has spent some time in Montana learning from a conflict specialist and a range-rider with experience with conflict prevention in that state.
